Inside Scientology

Scientology is recognized as a legal tax-exempt religion in the United States, South Africa, Australia, Sweden, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Portugal, and Spain. It is recorded to have between 25,000 and 55,000 active Scientologists even though the Scientology official website claims they have a growth of more than 4.4 million followers each year. This is a big deal either way considering the short amount of time its been around. It was invented in 1952 by American non-fiction author L. Ron Hubbard. The first church of Scientology only took two years to open in 1954 in Los Angeles. Scientology is One of the most controversial new religious movements to have come about in the 20th century. The church is often characterized as a cot and it has faced harsh scrutiny for many of its practices which include brainwashing, routinely defrauding its members, as well as attacking its critics and perceived enemies with psychological abuse character assassination, and costly lawsuits. meaning you've been cleansed of all traumatic memories and feelings you can climb the ladder to more powerful positions after clear comes a state called operating Thetan. According to Scientology the highest level that you can accomplish is an Operating Thetan or an OT. The OT is supposedly able to control or operate thought, life, matter, energy, space, and time Whether he or she has a body and mind or not. OT's can allegedly move inanimate objects with their minds, leave their bodies at Will and telepathically communicate with, and control the behavior of, both animals and human beings. There are 1–8 known levels to accomplish before reaching the ot level.

One of the first things Scientology has you do is something called auditing. An auditor takes an individual known as a pre-clear through times in their life and gets rid of any past or current Negative situations. They do this by taking you in a room and the auditor repeatedly asks you to repeat the story over and over again for ten hours while the story gets changed and altered into something completely different from what originally happened. It seems as though it brainwashes the individual into believing that the negative story was positive and didn't occur the way they once thought it did.

According to the official Scientology website, auditing is meant to restore beingness and ability. This is accomplished by helping the individual rid of himself of any spiritual disabilities and increasing one's abilities.

They also believe that when you're going through the story and explaining to them what happened Your soul is going back in time to when the moment occurred. Not that you're just thinking about it and telling the story.

Scientology is very secretive and it's hard to find any solid information about what exactly takes place in the churches, their practices, and even how much money they spend on the regular to keep up with Scientology prices. What we do know is that it does cost a lot of money. It's estimated to have a book value of about 1.75 billion.

Jeffery Augustine, the author of Scientology Money Project, estimates the church has an annual revenue of 200 million.

Once you're in the church it's very hard to leave. It took ex Scientologists to have to literally escape. Leah Remini was brought into Scientology at a young age by her mother. Over time she was exposed to the full truths of the so-called religion. Leah and her family agreed that they no longer wanted to be affiliated with the organization so they left. It wasn't easy. None of her family is allowed to contact any active Scientologists. It's not just them though it's everyone who leaves Scientology. After leaving the organization you would be called a suppressive person, or sp, and must be shunned by everyone in the practice.

Leaving isn't the only thing that will get you to be shunned by all their fellow Scientologists that you've been through the entire process with you for years. Even just talking bad about Scientology will get you kicked out and ignored.
